

For those of you who want to register, this year we are using NCCC's online registration system. It's actually pretty simple to use. Copy the following link, and

paste it into the address bar on your internet browser:

https://www.corvettesnccc.org/NCCCOnlineRegistration/Programs/Registration.php?eventId=305.

It will automatically take you to the registration page. Skip the car number at the top of the page. For some reason the database fills that in with the next sequential number. We can change the number later if you have paid for a permanent West Region number. Start your registration by filling in your NCCC number in the appropriate box. If you don't know your number, it's on your membership card. The other fields will selfpopulate down to information about your car. Enter that information, including the class you run in. If you don't know that, you can look it up using the NCCC Competition Rulebook that can the found on **NCCC** website www.corvettesnccc.org. Or, you can just choose a class and we will properly classify you later. You will then have to check off the boxes corresponding to the events you want to participate in. So, if you want to run all 21 events, you'll have to click all 21 boxes. I guess it would be too simple to have a box marked "Enter all Events" so you only have to mark one box. Once you complete those steps, click on "Send my registration to Corvette Club of Iowa". That's it.

After you register, you will get your Registration Information. If you selected all the events, it says the Total Registration cost is \$210. If you register

and pay before May 20<sup>th</sup>, your cost will only be \$175. That payment is to be made to Laurie McCracken at the address listed at the bottom of this message. We will email you additional information after your registration has been received.

So, I hope to see you all at Ankeny! It should be a fun weekend, whether you're competing, working, visiting with friends or making new friends.

We are also busy with our next club events. Originally, we had planned to have our second autocross June 25-26. Cornhusker Corvette Club called and said they had a conflict and wanted to change dates with us. We agreed, and our second low-speed autocross is now scheduled for September 24-25. # Board Meeting, March 3, 2022




























# SPECIAL CORVETTES (Part 1)

At a recent Corvette Club of Iowa Board Meeting, I volunteered to write an article for *Sportsmate*. A smart aleck in the group suggested that my story be about a talking raccoon. While I'm sure I could write a pretty amusing tale about a wise-cracking raccoon, I thought about how I might make the story something that, instead, would appeal to a group of Corvette enthusiasts. The only correlation I could make to a raccoon was that the nose stripe on a C3 Corvette ZL-1 looks a little bit like the dark stripe across a raccoon's eyes. So naturally, this article has to be about some rare and unusual Corvettes I've had the opportunity to see.

As I've alluded to previously, I became a Corvette fan at the tender age of about 5. My cousin had one and when I saw it, I was really touched by it. This car was so different than any of the conservative vehicles my father and grandfather used. It was loud and brash and I loved the styling. This car started my love affair with the Corvette, a love affair that I still have today.

#### **BLOOMINGTON GOLD**

In 1984, I had my first opportunity to visit the Bloomington Gold event in Bloomington/Normal, Illinois. I was overwhelmed with all the Corvettes being displayed and judged at that show on the Illinois State University campus. That was my first encounter with some cars I had only read about in magazines. I would be privileged to see many more special cars through my work at Barrett-Jackson and some pretty amazing contacts I would develop over the years. As I recall, displayed inside the Bloomington Gold Special Collection that year were 3 of the 5 original 1963 Grand Sports.





Of course, I had heard about these amazing cars, but to see genuine Grand Sports wasn't something I was expecting. They were awesome and they made such abundant and melodious noise! Before that night, I didn't know that some of these cars first raced as convertibles. Although it was nearly 40 years ago, I remember Grand Sport #01 (in bright shiny red) and Grand Sport #02. To the best of my memory, #02 was displayed like the white and blue version pictured above. Accompanying these two cars at this prestigious event was either #04 or #05.

Also in the Special Collection was another car that intrigued me. It seemed like it was a green C3 with whitewall tires and the "deluxe wheel covers" that I was never a fan of. These were supposed to be unique performance cars displayed in the Special Collection and I couldn't see anything special about this one... until I read the display board indicating it was an L88 car. I think it was the first one I'd ever actually seen. The rest of the collection was equally amazing and a truly mythical experience for me. There were other remarkable cars there, too.

#### 1969 ZL-1 Corvette

The car that prompted the topic for this article was a yellow C3 Corvette with that black band above the chrome front bumper that turns to follow the contour up and over the wheel arches and concludes in a point above the gills at the rear of the front fender. At the time, I thought it looked a little silly. Why would someone put a goofy stripe like that on an otherwise good-looking car? I later learned that the "someone" was General Motors and that the stripe identified the car as a ZL-1. This factory option was a 1969-only, special aluminum L88 big block fitted with

a dry-sump oil system and it weighed 100 lbs. less than a regular L88 engine. It was originally intended to replace the L88. The factory rated the ZL-1 at 430hp, but it actually put out between 560 and 585 brake horsepower. As for rarity, only two of these unique cars were made and this one is the only one that is fully documented. The ZL-1 option included a transistor ignition system, special front and rear suspension, special heavy-duty brakes and a positraction rear axle. These cars were all about performance over comfort, so they were unavailable with air-conditioning and a radio. The ZL-1 option was a pricey one for 1969, at \$4,718.35. As a result, the purchase price of a 1969 ZL-1 Corvette would be \$10,048.15. The stripe looked better after I found out the facts about the car!





#### **DETROIT TRIP**

During a CCI road trip to Detroit in 2015, I arranged for a tour of the GM Heritage Collection, which featured concept cars and special-interest styling/performance one-offs, along with significant race cars and milestone production vehicles. It was here that we were treated to seeing Corvette concept cars such as the 1965 Mako Shark, 1969 Manta Ray, the 1990 CERV III and many other historic GM vehicles, too numerous to mention. Courtesy of some of my GM buddies, we even had a tour next door at the secret(ish) special performance shop. It was a great trip. The Heritage Collection is open to the public and I would recommend it for anyone visiting Detroit. Below are descriptions of a few of the cars we saw.

#### 1965 Mako Shark

This car may be the most influential Corvette prototype ever produced. According to Wikipedia, the **XP-755 concept car**, also known as the **Mako Shark**, was designed by Larry Shinoda under the direction of General Motors Styling and Design head Bill Mitchell. With the 1963 Corvette C2 design locked down, in 1961 as a concept for future Chevrolet Corvettes, the groundwork for the XP-755 was laid down. Building on the design of the 1958 XP-700 "double bubble," the XP-755 added design elements of the soon to be released C2 Corvette. In keeping with the name, the streamlining, pointed snout and other detailing was partly inspired by the sleek, fast-moving shortfin mako shark. The '61 Corvette tail was given two additional tail lights (six total) for the concept car. The concept was also inspired by Bill Mitchell's 1959 Stingray racer XP-87 which also influenced the 1963 Corvette Sting Ray. Like many show cars, the Mako Shark underwent styling and detail changes over time. The hood and front facia were modified and the interior was updated. The car also lost the distinctive "double-bubble" canopy. The car was retroactively dubbed the Mako Shark I when the Mako Shark II debuted.

A second Mako Shark, known as the Mako Shark II (XP-830), was a non-running show car sporting futuristic details such as square section side pipes and a squared-off steering wheel. This car debuted at the 1965 New York Auto Show. The second running show car made its debut at the 1965 Paris Motor Show with more conventional steering wheel and exhaust. The car did have a retractable rear spoiler and a square section bumper that could be extended for added protection. The Mako Shark II was powered by a 427 Mark IV engine, which became available on production Corvette models. The paint scheme was similar to the original Mako Shark, with blue/gray on top fading into silver/white at the rockers. I distinctly remember seeing this special vehicle in my car magazines as an elementary school-age kid.

#### 1969 Manta Ray

In 1969 the Mako Shark II was returned to GM Design Studios and transformed into the Manta Ray. Modifications included a front spoiler and redesigned grille and external exhaust pipes. Modifications were also made to the rear that included a buttress style rear window and a longer more horizontal end section. The Firestone tires were replaced with Goodyear tires. A new, all-aluminum ZL-1 427ci (making approximately 430hp) was installed in the revised car.





#### **CERV III**

As you're probably aware, Chevrolet had been working on a mid-engine Corvette for many years prior to the release of the first production model C8 as a 2020 model. As reported on MotorTrend.com, of all the previous midengine Corvette prototypes, the 1990 CERV III was arguably the closest one to reaching production reality. The third Chevrolet Engineering Research Vehicle was an evolution of the 1986 Corvette Indy, and while it was intended as GM's showpiece for the 1990 Detroit auto show, many of its elements indicated the possibility of a production-ready car.

Much of the CERV III's technology is relatively commonplace today but in 1990, it was futuristic stuff: all-wheel drive, four-wheel steering and a computer-controlled active suspension. The transmission was a six-speed automatic, built from the existing Hydramatic three-speed, and the brakes used dual discs at each wheel.





#### Aerovette

According to another story by MotorTrend, by 1976 the Chevrolet Corvette, once "America's Sports Car," had been well and truly neutered. The C3 Corvette launched in 1968 had started off well enough, with svelte chrome bumpers, curvaceous styling borrowed from 1965's Mako Shark II concept, and a standard 300hp, 327ci V-8 engine. GM's engineers had even developed a "for racing only" L88 engine: a 430hp, 427ci V-8 that many say was closer to a 500hp, 500-lb-ft monster in reality.

Alas, the times were changing and as the U.S. rolled into the 1970s, the performance car seemed to suddenly be under threat. Emissions regulations began to become more strenuous, causing automakers to detune their fire-breathing performance motors with weak compression ratios and milder cams and carburetors. Oil shortages were leading to high gas prices at the pump and Corvette buyers themselves were aging, resulting in increased demands for comfort and, for the first time ever, more automatic-transmission Corvettes being sold than manual-equipped versions. Safety standards saw chrome bumpers replaced with plastic and by 1975, the standard Corvette engine was wheezing out just 165 horses from its 350 cubic inches.

Meanwhile, over a decade of mid-engine development work by "Father of the Corvette," Zora Arkus-Duntov had still not resulted in a production Vette with its engine mounted between the rear axle and the driver. Concepts and development mules had come and gone. From the CERV projects I through III, through the XP variants, and on to the rotary-powered projects, Arkus-Duntov simply wasn't able to make enough headway with GM's tough accounting-driven management team. Frustrated, he retired in 1975.

Then, in 1976, a year before his own retirement, GM's styling boss Bill Mitchell decided that maybe a mid-engine Corvette was the way forward after all. Despite having helped to shut down several of Arkus-Duntov's previous mid-engine projects, Mitchell pulled the then three-year-old XP-895 mid-engine prototype out of storage. Originally designed for GM's licensed 420hp, four-rotor experimental engine, Mitchell ordered the rotary removed and replaced with a 400ci (6.6-liter) Chevy V-8.

Mitchell was a fan of Italian car design and perhaps it was the plethora of mid-engine sports cars being developed in Italy in this period – think Lamborghini Countach; Fiat X/19; DeTomaso Pantera; Ferrari Dino, 308, and Berlinetta Boxer – that convinced him that GM needed a mid-engine performance car. He rechristened the gullwing-door concept the Aerovette and sent it off to the auto-show circuit, where the media and Corvette enthusiasts alike once again wondered if a mid-engine Corvette would become reality.

It almost did. However, Chevrolet decided to stick with the Corvette's tried and true front-engine configuration. Thus, the C4 Corvette we're all familiar with came to be, and while it wasn't as innovative as many would have liked, it did return the Corvette to a performance-oriented car.

So... the raccoon didn't do any talking in this piece, but isn't it odd how an off-the-wall suggestion can go in a different direction and jog the memory of an old man who has been romantically involved with special cars and big engines since childhood? This piece will be followed up next month with *SPECIAL CORVETTES (Part 2)* that will focus on Corvettes I've encountered during my work with the Barrett-Jackson Auction. I hope that maybe these experiences I'm sharing will stimulate some recollections in you, too. What a ride it's been, and as they say, it ain't over, yet! Happy motoring!


